What is Cursillo?

Cursillo is a movement of the church. It is a Diocesan under the leadership of the Bishop. Its purpose is to help those in the church understand their individual callings to be Christian leaders. The leadership may be exercised in work situations, in the family and social life, in leisure activities, and within the Church environment. Leadership, in Cursillo, does not mean power over others, but influence on others; all of us need to be aware that we can exert a positive influence on those around us.

DeColores! NC!

Hello! And DeColores to all of you cursillistas!

Cursillo is a method for training, supporting and ongoing development of Christian leadership. For graduated "cursillistas" they will tell you the retreat is fun, informative, made up of fellowship and song, besides learning. The Cursillo method contains two main components:

1) A 3-day weekend filled with 15 talks, group discussions, worship and fun... and

2) The 4th-day that represents how we live out the Christian life in support of one another.

There are a lot of Spanish terms like Ultreya and DeColores in the ministry. But did you know a layman named Eduardo Bonnín participated in the early years of the "short courses" in Majorca. He then helped develop the cursillo to the point that it became an active renewal movement in the Church. In 1957, the movement had spread to North America, when the first American **cursillo** was held in Waco, Texas. The ministry uses these Spanish terms to honor its heritage. The Fourth Day is an ongoing ministry for the cursillistas to apply everything they learned from their personal retreat/weekend. The secretariat is the governing body of cursillo in this diocese

Cursillista Testimonies

My name is Jay Maddocks. I made my Cursillo at #108 in the Diocese of North Carolina on July 18, 2019. I sat at the table of St. Maximillian Maria Kolbe. I attend St. Patrick's Church in Mooresville.

For me, Cursillo was a transformational experience, one where I felt very different leaving than I had before my arrival. When I left Cursillo I was "on the mountaintop;" a place familiar to many cursillistas and it's a great place to be. I want to go back there always. But I'm reminded that when Moses went up on the mountain he didn't stay there. He had to come down and bring what he received to others.

I thought I was completely changed when I left Cursillo.

Then about a week later I found myself getting angry with someone I really cared about. And I didn't feel very Christ-like. Later, I caught myself again, being untrue to my new self, when I sped through a yellow light at the end of an exit ramp instead of stopping to help the guy with the cardboard sign who was looking for help. I had a pile of quarters in my console next to me just waiting for that opportunity but I was eager to get home and didn't want to have to stop if I could make the light. I had done the same thing a million times previously, bypassing the opportunity to do good, but now I noticed it.

I'm still struggling for how to be better, and no, I'm not a brand new person. But Cursillo has indeed changed me. I'm now more fully in touch with the Holy Spirit within me than I was before. But change is a process. Not an event. And it is impossible to improve without first recognizing your failings. This is why it is so significant to me to remember that God ALWAYS loves us no matter what. This is the love I felt in my heart at Cursillo. The knowledge that I am a child of God who will always be loved. When we fail, God is here to welcome us back into his arms so that we can move past our shortcomings. As many times as it takes. We are always loved.

Forty-nine years of experience with Cursillo have convinced me that God will meet every pilgrim where they are and begin to move them forward in mission and ministry. I have learned never to predict what the particulars of that movement will be. I certainly never imagined on that February weekend long ago that I would be where I am, doing what I am doing, today. For me the most important part of that weekend was, having driven from College Park, Maryland to Manchester NH. and trying all day to go out and shovel the snow off my car (we had 2 1/2 feet of snow over night and I had to take an exam at 9 the next morning,) and being told, "You haven't got time right now. Don't worry about it. We'll help you get it done after we're finished", I went out after the closing service to find that my little Volkswagen had been not only shoveled out but also completely cleaned off, was running with the heat on (all nice and warm) with my bag already in it, a full tank of fuel, a basket of healthy finger foods and a large thermos of hot tea and a mug of steaming tea to start the trip with. The Cursillo Community had gathered early in the day and shoveled out everyone's vehicle and made sure they were gassed up, and warm when we came out. I truly understood what palanca meant. I began to trust others for the first time in my life. I connected my faith in God to my faith in God to act in, and through God's people! That was only one learning from my weekend, but it is the most important and has had the most consistent presence in my life. That was Palanca lived out and it made a world of difference to me and to all the pilgrims and team. Those who did it had no idea the lasting nature that gift would have. We had two Pilgrims from St Matthew's in Kernersville on NC #108. They will tell their own stories in the days and years to come. Those stories will encourage others as they were encouraged. We are all pilgrims on a journey. As I welcomed our pilgrims home I was aware

of the smiles that came from a place deep within and the mixture of joy and perhaps a bit of hesitancy about the as yet unknown future that lies ahead. They have both continued the work that God began in them on the weekend. Each in her own way is praying and pondering the different things God has stirred up in them. If I have learned anything over the past 49 years it is that with the support of the community and of their families these ponderings and prayers will continue and lead to new, surprising and glorious adventures over the years to come.

Reunion Groups

Finding a Reunion Group or Starting Your Own (From Arlington Cursillo)

Check in with your sponsor. Even if it's been a while since your Weekend and you've been grouping but would like to try something different, your sponsor may be able to provide some guidance.

Check in with the team members from your Weekend, especially the members who were at your table. Team members typically are active in Cursillo, and may know of groups in your area that are open to new members... or know how to get in contact with Cursillo leaders in your parish or a nearby parish.

Go to a diocesan Ultreya or your parish Ultreya or one nearby. You may find people in your own backyard whose groups are open to new members or who want to begin grouping.

Reach out to people at other Cursillo events... when candidates are being dropped off or picked up for a Weekend, for example.

Check in with the other "babe chicks" from your Weekend. Was there a man or woman with whom you particularly "clicked"? Even if you live at opposite ends of the diocese, get together for coffee or talk via e-mail or phone. He or she may know of people who are looking to group near you.

My Reunion Group

I'm <u>not</u> a "cradle Episcopalian".....so I continue to have a lot to learn.....

For the better part of two decades, I've been part of our "<u>Men's</u> <u>Reunion Group</u>" at St. Clement's, in Clemmons, NC.(My editor wanted me to be sure and explain that Reunion Groups can be for women only, men only, and coed.)

We meet every Saturday morning at 8:00. Sessions tend to be attended by from 3 to eleven members; we average about 7 attendees. Our sessions tend to last two hours, but have on rare occasion gone on for almost three hours.

Our Reunion Group discussions have an ongoing impact on who we are, individually, and where each of us might be going with our lives.

We follow-the Reunion Card outline every Saturday: Piety, Study, Action.

Let me share an introduction with you about this <u>Men's Reunion</u> <u>Group</u>.

--- Our senior member was a pitcher for the New York Yankees. He and his wife live in an Assisted Living facility. We work to meet there --- once a month, on Saturday morning.

--- One member is a practicing Jew, whom we cherish. He served in the Israeli Army.

--- Another member taught physicsat universities, in the U.S. Army, and in China.

--- Another member is an immigrant from Japan, and a family psychologist, who worked in our local Social Services department, for well over 20 years, and also attends with me in my EfM class.

--- Another member is a CPA, and regularly plays the banjo, guitar, mandolin, and piano.

--- Another member is the IT Director for a regional, fast-growing bank.

--- Another member is a part-time substitute math and Special-Ed teacher. (He also has ambitions to become a "stand-up comic".)

--- Another member headed-up the "Special Events Department" for a major tobacco company, and now is one of our informal junior wardens --- at our parish.

--- Another member recently started-up a Child Psychology Clinic --in a rural Western NC community --- he drives there several days a week.

--- Another member is a retired NC State Trooper, who recently became a Deacon in the Episcopal Diocese of NC. As this testimonial offers, Reunion Groups can include priests as well as lay people. --- Another member is a lab technician in an oncology lab. He sometimes offers testimony to how his spiritual life was elevated by his Cursillo Weekend, and how the ongoing presence of God and the Holy Spirit elevate the quality of his work, and his unselfish contributions to his lab associates' work.

--- And I continue to work as a consultant to commercial printing and publishing companies --- mostly in the U.S. --- working to generate prosperity for individuals and organizations --- that serve to keep their many communities --- connected.

We recently had a new Cursillista attend our Saturday session, as she's working to start-up a Reunion Group --- at her parish in Kernersville. She wanted to see and experience how our process functioned.

Along with my final semester of EfM, my Saturday morning Reunion Group sessions ---are the two most important sessions of my week, every week.

Four of our group --- are members of our Vestry. When there's a dinner, or parish picnic, or project...this Men's Reunion Group represents part of the backbone for "getting things done".

Our parish priest does not oppose Cursillo. And though she does not yet seem to understand Cursillo, and what this Men's Reunion Group means to our parish, we keep softly working --- to invite her in.

If you're not in a Reunion Group, you're probably missing something that could be important.... and not just to you.

Members of this Reunion Group, and other Cursillistas --- throughout our diocese, are available to assist any Cursillista --- who wants to start-up a Reunion Group.
