Matthew 18: 15 "If your brother sins, go and show him his fault in private; if he listens to you, you have won your brother. 16 But if he does not listen *to you*, take one or two more with you, so that by the mouth of two or three witnesses every fact may be confirmed. 17 If he refuses to listen to them, tell it to the church; and if he refuses to listen even to the church, let him be to you as a Gentile and a tax collector.

Luke 17 3 Be on your guard! If your brother sins, rebuke him; and if he repents, forgive him. 4 And if he sins against you seven times a day, and returns to you seven times, saying, 'I repent,' forgive him."

## Participants credit Cursillo with lifechanging ministry

'He's an old man, but when he begins talking about Cursillo, and the Lord he knows, you see 25 years shaved off,' says Noecker. When Father Maat first read about the Cursillo movement in 1958, he told himself, 'If that movement ever gets going in the United States, I want to become involved.'

He made his first Cursillo the summer of 1963. Today, Father Maat is spiritual director of the Region XII Cursillo Movement.

Cursillo was founded by layman Eduardo Bonnin in 1944 on the Spanish island of Mallorca. Since then, more than three million people around the world have participated in the movement. Bonnin believes that when people act as true Christ-like friends to one another, they form a positive cycle of energy that helps each of them to become more Christ-like.

In his talks, Bonnin, now 81, tells people that, 'You can't say to someone, 'You must go to church.' You say, 'You must be friends of mine.' When the bridge is built, then you can speak of Christ.' 'It tells you to make a friend, be a friend, and bring a friend to Christ,' says Howell.

Bonnin studied the works of theologians such as Yves Congar and psychologists such as Carl Rogers, then organized the theology and psychology into the short talks.

The weekend retreats are for many a powerful conversion experience.

'I know that the Holy Spirit is there.'

When she leads Cursillos, Pat Noecker from Seattle, asks retreatants not to judge the Cursillo until Sunday. By then, she says, 'you're so open to your neighbor that the scales just fall from your eyes, and you see so clearly.'

Noecker says it's hard to describe a Cursillo. 'To change a life forever,' she muses. 'At least it changed my husband's and mine.' The Noeckers made their first Cursillo 27 years ago, first him, then her a week later.

Noecker says that chance meetings with other Cursillistas have brought her delight when she travels. 'You start out at a different level of sharing,' she says. 'You already have something in common: his name is Jesus.'

Noecker shares the story of a friend of her family's, a stoic and unemotional man who, over years of summer camping trips, chose to read rather than interact with his wife and children. When he made his Cursillo, says Noecker, he came away in tears, saying that he hadn't realized that other men felt this way. After his Cursillo, Noecker says he put away his books (for some of the time) in favor of talking and enjoying time with his wife and children.

'There was an internal change,' Noecker says. 'Cursillo helps you discover your gifts, and then use them for Christ in the world.' Noecker admits that the Cursillo movement may sometimes look a bit gray, despite its theme song of 'DeColores.'

She thinks it's because she and other Cursillistas often befriend and sponsor people who look like themselves. 'But everyone is encouraged to go,' she says.

Well, perhaps not everyone. People must have a sponsor to attend a Cursillo weekend, and their pastor must vouch that they are 'far enough along with their walk with Christ to understand the messages of the weekend,' says the San Diego Cursillo group. About a month after the Cursillo, the participants regroup for a 'Fourth Day.'

'People become kind of high on the weekend,' says Noecker. 'We know they'll come down to reality, and that's the time to review the tools they learned over the Cursillo.'

Marge Howell attended the weekend's final day as a friend of the new Cursillistas. She and her husband Jack made their first Cursillos in 1992.

'It's so different than anything else I've ever attended,' says Howell. 'It's a chance to get your understanding of the Christian Church straight. It brings you to life.'

Howell says that one of the consequences of her Cursillo is that now she reads good books - not necessarily religious, but always thought-provoking and meaningful.

For Howell, the weekend, as meaningful as it is, was a means to lead her to her small group reunions.

Like other Cursillistas, she meets weekly with a small group of three to five persons - in her case composed of men and women of different faiths. They share their week and become good friends. Together, says Howell, they learn how to share their lives with friends. 'It changes the way you speak to one another,' she says. 'You see the truth.'

The weekly group reunions begin with a prayer. The members then discuss three topics: holiness, formation, and evangelization. They don't interrupt one another and they keep confidential what is discussed.

For the first topic, holiness, Howell says that they share what most helped them find holiness during the week, and the time that they felt most aware of Christ's presence. That might happen, says Howell, when someone is gardening or perhaps listening to beautiful music.

The second topic is formation. The members share what they have read or experienced during the week to help change their mentality to be more Christian.bring about a change in the world. 'Evangelization is love in action,' says Howell. 'It might be time spent with a sick neighbor.'

The group then closes with a prayer of thanksgiving and the Lord's Prayer.'Cursillo saved me,' says Howell. 'I've been a Catholic all my life, but I think that Cursillo has brought joy and clarity into my life and given me courage and assurance that God loves me. You're filled to bursting when you leave.'
